- 1.Stock your vehicle with a few extra bottles of water, sunscreen and a first aid kit.
- 2. Wear light, breathable clothing to help your body stay cooler.
- 3.Use sunscreen with a high SPF, and use it frequently when swimming or sweating.
- 4. Seek shade whenever possible.
- 5. Wear a hat, which can help protect your face and shoulders from the sun.

Vehicle Extrication Skill Building

In May, providers had the opportunity to learn and improve upon their vehicle and machinery extrication skills through a shift-training with FF Bill Dunlap from Clark County Fire District No. 6. With over thirty-years of service as a firefighter, Dunlap has seen and responded to many critical extrication incidents; through his knowledge sharing our providers practiced scene size up and honed their skills to extricate patients for quick transport to emergency care.

Tactical Casualty Care

In April, providers with Skamania EMS & Rescue participated in a Tactical Casualty Care course, designed to teach and improve skills related to response during traumatic, high-threat emergencies.

This class was provided in a hybrid-format, requiring providers to complete twenty-three hours of online education followed by two-days of in person, scenario and skills based training.

With the help of volunteers playing the role of "victim" providers were able to exercise the response concepts and learned how to provide care in potentially dangerous conditions with limited resources.
